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Mimic Jesus

Jesus' call to people 2,000 years ago is the same simple, yet weighty call to you and me today! He succinctly summarised His entire plan for the disciples in just two words: "Follow Me". (Matthew 4:19) Those two words were what He spoke to Peter, Andrew, James and John as they fished, and to Matthew as he sat at the tax office (Luke 5:27); and those two words are what He still calls for on the streets of Auckland, in our homes, and at work.

Are you personally following Jesus? Is your day lived with Christ? Is the presence, power and mission of Jesus your goal, your focus?

As He taught, Jesus explained that His people were those who heard His voice, became His sheep, and *followed Him* (John 10:27). Jesus called those followers His disciples or *learners*. The gospels are a record of how disciples spent time with Jesus for over three years watching, listening, and most of all *following Him*.

Do you hear His voice today?

Jesus called Himself *The Way*; and described salvation as the beginning of a life-long journey of following Him (John 14:6). This call to a life of following, at times needs to be renewed. Jesus demonstrated this after His resurrection, when Peter was restored to ministry as Jesus again said *follow Me* (John 21:19).

Is the path, the trajectory of your life toward or away from Jesus?

Christ's plan was to have close, personal *followers* who were also learners and doers of His Way. They listened to and followed Him as they learned from Him how to do what He did. The Church at the beginning was simple, everyone was following Jesus, acting so much like Him they were described by unbelievers as little-Christ-imitators or *Christ-ians*. As the church gathered, they were taught that every facet of their lives were to be reflective of what they learned while following Jesus personally. This *learning-and-doing-by-example* model was the key to the early church growing; Paul described a plan for having each person in Christ's church actually involved in a life-long learning process of following Jesus Christ. This is why believers are called imitations or *mimics* of Jesus Christ. The Greek word in the bible for *follow* and *followers* is *mimetes* (literally *mimics*). Paul took this idea to its full expression when he challenged the Corinthian believers (1 Cor 11:1), "Follow me as I follow Christ," or mimic me as I mimic Jesus!

I often challenge myself with this thought. Today would I be brave and transparent enough to say the same to someone else? Would I say, "Follow me" ... ?

I think everyone experiences it: It is not until something is gone that you miss it. It's not until you are without something that you realise how much you value it. We have the option to *just go with it* and let that be an ongoing reality, but our calling and our conviction is to live with greater purpose than that.

So imagine this... you get sick. You spend the week miserable and fighting a cold and you think to yourself, "I forgot to remember to be thankful for my health last week." Inevitably you get better slowly and you have two options. One, just get on with it and do the whole pattern on repeat and remember to value your health when next you get a violent reminder of what it is like to not have it, or two, start to value your health in a way that alters your thinking and your living: Eating starts to become more considered and healthy; exercise starts to make it back onto the priority list of the day; sleep is no longer an incidental, "I'll-go-to-bed-when-I-get-it-all-done," kind of mentality. Things change, because that value is illuminated, held under a microscope, recognised as a life-altering experience and placed in front of us as not just the experience of *real* life, but the experience of *ideal* life.

Church is often just a reflection of how we live our lives—a macro-version of life maybe, because it is collective, but it certainly is a mirror that reflects what it is we *value* explicitly and what it is we just *do* implicitly. Church health? Same deal. We often don't know what we value until it is missing, and even then

we have a choice. Do we hold it up and start to reorient our habits and our living around this value? Or, do we just fall into routine and remember to value it the next time we notice its absence and proceed to get on the treadmill of reaction and damage control? Then, we sigh when the whole thing lands itself back in bed for a week or two taking medicine every couple of hours, or worse case scenario, in the hospital for an extended period of time in need of an intense rehab program.

As a local church, we didn't want to be on an *implicit* value track. It's not okay with us to ask a Papsda person what we value here at this local church and have the answer be a shrug, or, "I am not sure", or "you will have to ask the pastor." Values need to be part of our DNA, because they reorient our time and our resources... and we don't want to recognise these values by knowing what is missing, we want to recognise them by living them and aspiring to them.

Two years ago I (Norman) discovered that Papsda was changing and it wasn't clear what it was we were holding up in front of us as our aspirational and real values in this next season... and the season was changing. So we gathered. A group of willing leaders and volunteers (of a variety of gifting, ages and stages) crammed ourselves into a room for several weeks over multiple meetings to try to discover what it was we valued. What does our activity indicate is important to us? What are we uniquely equipped and gifted to do? What do we aspire to as a community? If our church

disappeared would anyone notice?

After wrestling this out over a period of months—dealing with our differences, our thoughts, the silences, the fatigue and the lack of clarity, 7 values emerged and 7 values stuck and 7 values remain. Now as Adventists we love the number 7, but the reason there are 7 is really because if any one of them went missing then something we value would be missing and we don't want to wait until it's gone to realise that. We want to reorient our lives, our time and our resources in the deliberate pursuit of these values. We feel called to that, compelled by it, convicted of its importance and set to live it out to the best of our abilities. We want every Papsda person to be able to recite it, live it and aspire toward it.

We sense momentum and change. We know that our community would indeed notice our absence if Papsda disappeared. They would ask: "Where has that **INCLUSIVE COMMUNITY** of **STAUNCH FOLLOWERS** gone? Where are those **CREATIVE** people that are constantly **CHANGING** and **SELFLESSLY SERVING** with **GENEROSITY** that blows our minds? Where are the ones that celebrate life **HOLISTICALLY**, with body, soul and mind?" Where are those people that love God and love us?

It is with great conviction that we speak, pray and move toward the reality of that which we value. It is with great thankfulness that each day we have the privilege to live out the reality of that which we value. It is with great determination that we set our minds in a deliberate way to be mindful of that which we value.

Papsda, we will not only notice what we value, by sensing its absence... We will know, define and set our hearts toward it. Because if God values it, we do too.

I work in one of the poorest areas of New Zealand. Every day I see evidence of this when students come to school—students who come without eating breakfast, students who don't have books, students whose school shoes are held together with masking tape and students who pretend that life is easy for them—but it is not. We do what we can to meet the daily need. The school provides breakfast, we have a collection of black shoes we give to students who need them, staff have helped buy school uniforms and also helped to pay school fees. For me, meeting the daily need and having the opportunity to encourage students to stay in school and praying with them is one of the most fulfilling things that I have done recently. It is also something that I continue to do daily because my school is my place of service.

The kingdom was real, present and walking through the streets of South Auckland.

Remember how we asked: "What's next?" We know we could let this be a one-time awesome memory or we could build, extend and engage once again and see what the Spirit does this year. What is in store for iCAN58 2016?

There's a Date: Sabbath, 27th of August 2016.

There's a Purpose: As a regional cluster, the churches and schools of South Auckland (South Auckland Samoan, Papsda, Calvary Community, South Auckland SDA Primary and ASDAH) have the united heartbeat to see our community transformed by our love for each other. We want to have



eyes to see and meet the needs in our immediate communities and beyond.

There's a Plan:

- A Sabbath morning prayer walk
- Worship service, celebration and story
- Lunch in the park
- Afternoon food drop in Clendon

There's a Posture: Joshua 1:3 & 5 "I promise you what I promised Moses: 'Wherever you set foot, you will be on land I have given you ... No one will be able to stand against you as long as you live. For I will be with you as I was with Moses. I will not fail you or abandon you.'"

So our posture is to be strong and courageous. It is what is termed a *prophetic posture*. It's a united body claiming what is to come by standing firm in our faith that God will do what He says He will do. It is about entering victorious, claiming land and knowing we cannot fail.

When we do this, when we are able to see the harvest before the seed has even broken through the soil, amazing transformation starts to take place. Harvest begins even before the fruit is visible.

Our prophetic posture transforms our communities through:

1. Our Visibility.
2. Our Engagement.
3. Our Incarnational (from within) Involvement and Commitment

We choose to remain visible in Clendon. In addition to that, we seek to engage further because we believe the Holy Spirit is working through iCan58, through our sisterhood of churches and through August 27th 2016. We believe that before we even step foot on the land which is His to claim for the harvest, He is there and He is making streams of living water through the desert (Isaiah 58). Let's be part of that mission.

Let's mark it in our calendars Papsda because there is much, much more to come!

When I first met Liliani the burden of debt was heavy. She was struggling to provide for her children and pay her debts. But the burden started to lift as she was given hope... hope that she was no longer alone in this struggle, hope that there were others who cared about her, and hope as she started to see God's provision in her life.

This past week the Lotulelei family received a huge blessing! They needed to sell their car in order to release money into their budget for basic living expenses. One person from the church agreed to help her get her car cleaned so she could sell it and get a good price for it.

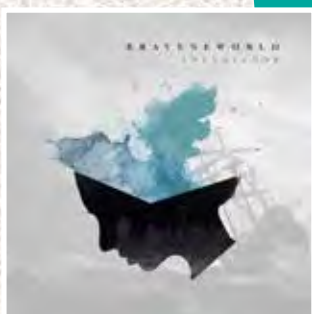
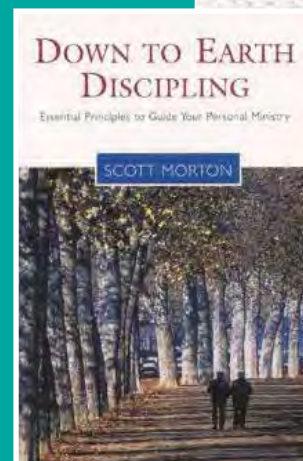
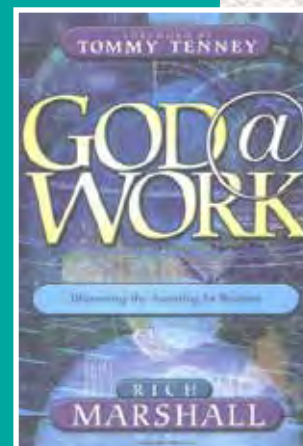
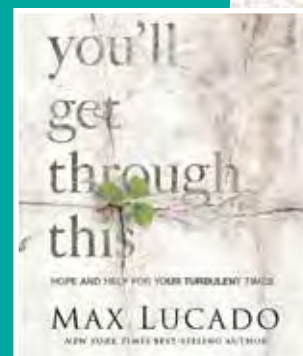
LISTEN:

Tell us your name and your nick-name. I was named Lorraine Emily Mercy Reuben, the second daughter of my God-fearing parents Samuel and Priscilla Reuben. Where do you originate from and where are you living now? I was born in Durban, Kwazulu-Natal in South Africa. Where do you originate from and where are you now? I'm originally from Brazil, from a very small town deep in the country where there was basically no technology, no television, and no electricity. Life was pretty basic. As I grew up with no parental guidance, living was a bit "here and there" and life was meaningless. I was always moving from place to place looking for something better. God gave me three children which gave some meaning in my life, and from that time I started living for my kids. But in my heart, something was missing and I couldn't figure out what it was. One day I was on the side of the road trying to get a lift to the next city to sell fruit, and one car stopped. Two

young men very well dressed in their suits came to me and said, "Sorry, I can't take you because you have too much stuff—it can't fit in the car, but we just stopped to tell you Jesus loves you". Those words! They impacted me to the core and whole my body shook. I couldn't control my tears. Today thinking about it, I wonder if the two men were angels God sent to bring me hope at a time where I had none.

What's your occupation? As I was always on the move looking for better life, we ended up here in Auckland. Life was hard in the beginning as we couldn't speak any English. I felt as if I had landed on another planet! However, here I was and God prepared the way for me. We had a friend here that helped us with our English and work—interior and exterior house painting. Now I'm happily living in Wattle Downs with my daughter and my son-in-law and their two beautiful kids. I'm experiencing the joy of being a mother again as I'm full-time grandmother looking after my grandsons while my daughter goes to work.

Where do you serve at Papsda? This year I started helping in the library and in the kitchen. I love to help as it helps me to make new friends. The relationships with my team give me new ideas and give me purpose.

What has been your most surprising discovery about God lately? Something that keeps prodding me is the mission that Christ commanded us as His disciples to go and make disciples of all nations teaching them to observe all things He has commanded us. Because of those commands I took part in the *Contagious Christian* course that Karl and Karyn led back in April. It was really good as once again I could feel the love and care of God for the lost, like I once was. It's a privilege to be a follower of Jesus, but it's a big responsibility too. I hope, pray and believe that God's will can be accomplished in my life.

SETTING THE *Stage*

may or may not have noticed a number of significant changes that have taken place around our building complex.

After more than 25 years the church has undergone a number of essential major upgrades. The main area of the church was re-carpeted, re-painted and wallpaper replaced a few years ago. The major internal gutters have been replaced and a new expanded alarm and smoke detection system installed in every room. As a sign of the times, a CCTV security system has progressively had to be installed throughout the complex. By this time the carpet in the sanctuary had reached a very sad state after almost 30 years.

Thanks to the generous contributions of the people of Papsda, the carpet offering reached \$46,000 and a team considered and recommended what work needed to be done. Of particular interest was the need to improve Health and Safety requirements, remove the need for cables running everywhere during major programmes and to improve the safety of the stage and stairs. Also to improve the appearance of the stage by removing much of the clutter of equipment.

VIDEO RECORDING

As a result a Video Recording Room has been set up in part of the Parent/Children's Room and five video recording connections have been placed in strategic points in the floor and side walls of the building.

SOUND & LIGHTING

The Sound and Lighting Team had some excellent recommendations for tidying up the stage by providing channels to hide the cables in the stage floor, making the steps safer by removing the very narrow steps on either side and using the space to lower or conceal the fold-back speakers.

THE STAGE

The temporary staging we have been using for many years has now been built in and at the same time built the whole stage to the same height creating one

complete safe, level surface. We still have some work to do before the stage is complete.

CARPET

In July 2015, we ordered 900 square metres of carpet for \$38,250 plus the expected cost of carpet laying, other materials and fittings and specialist cabling work. All the preparation for removal of pews, lifting of the carpet and alterations was completed by volunteers.

After much planning, Monday evening October 20 saw a strong team of young people and ShedX members, up in the balcony, moving the pews, lifting the carpet and scraping off all the glued rubber underlay ready for the carpet layer to start. It took the whole week to prepare and lay the carpet after which the carpet layer went on a much deserved two week holiday.

Sunday afternoon, November 9 saw a group of (mainly older) people moving all the pews (which are very heavy) into the hall and lifting and removing all the carpet. At the same time a group of ladies worked at cleaning the dining room and hall chairs. The carpet layer had most of the carpet laid by Thursday afternoon so a group of 12 strong men were able to replace most of the pews in the evening. All was back in place ready for Sabbath.

The work on the stage was delayed until after Easter to fit in with the Easter Praise Service and availability of Richard Van Weerd and David Harvey to carry out the modifications to the stage and the addition of two large sound and lighting cupboards in the back of the stage with a cabinet to house all the sound gear in one place, off the stage and around the church. At the same time, Finé Teulilo spent a lot of time moving and rewiring all our sound gear.

The total cost is over \$60,000 with the extra funds coming from the building rental income. We are very grateful for all the volunteer hours and hard work (you know who you are—thank you) which has saved a huge amount of the cost of the finished project, resulting in a clean, modern, open stage. ■

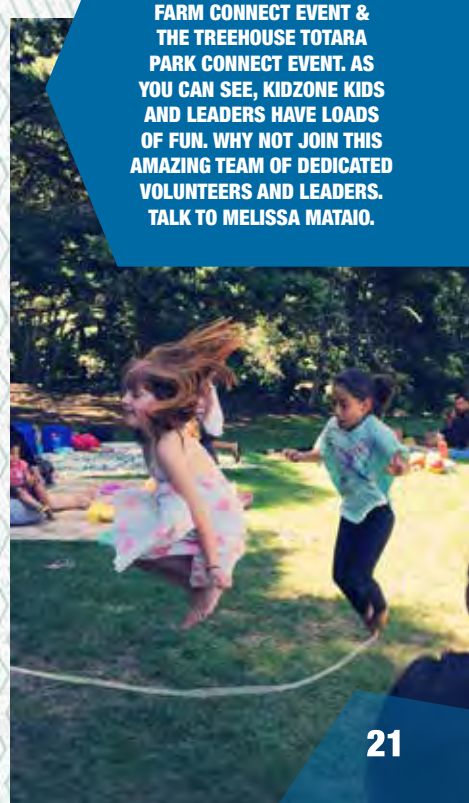
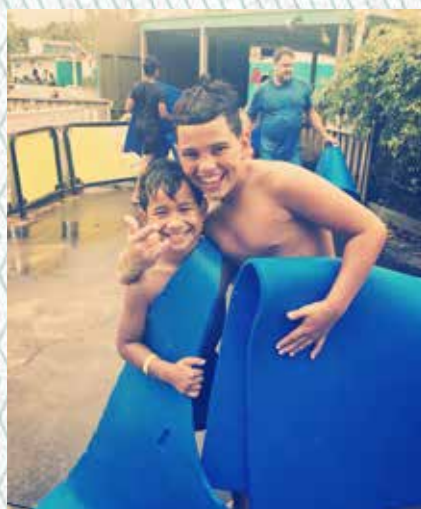

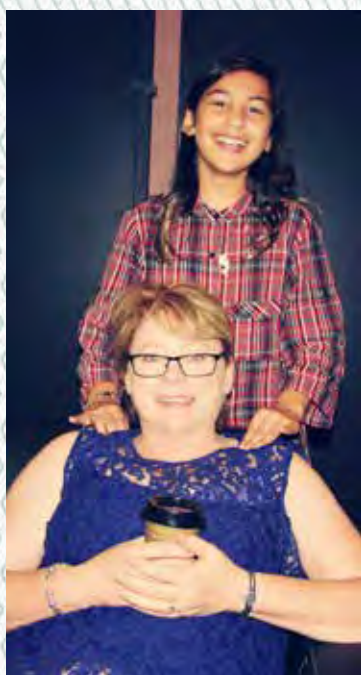
TASTY CARROT SOUP

- 3 cups of water
- 2 Teaspoon chicken or vegetable stock
- 2 Tablespoon Peanut Butter
- 1 Tablespoon Soy Sauce
- 1 Teaspoon Nutmeg
- Pinch oregano
- 2 cloves crushed garlic
- 1 onion chopped
- 1 cup milk (optional)

Method:

Mix all ingredients in a pot and boil until carrots are soft.
Blend together and add 1 cup of milk (this is optional).
Swirl sour cream or cream on top to garnish.





ELAINE'S GLUTEN STROGANOFF

Gluten Steaks

2 eggs
1 Packet Maggi French Onion Soup
1 cup Milk
Soy Sauce to taste
Herbs to taste
Handful of Rolled Oats
1 cup Gluten Flour

Canola oil to fry
(see extra ingredients for broth)

Method:

Mix ingredients together in the above order.
Add more water if mixture is too stiff. It needs to be quite soft.

Fry gently in spoonfuls.
Once fried, place in a pot of water with 1 chopped onion, 1 packet of Maggi mushroom soup, 1 teaspoon of Marmite and 2 dessert-spoons of Bisto dissolved in water.
Simmer for 20 minutes.

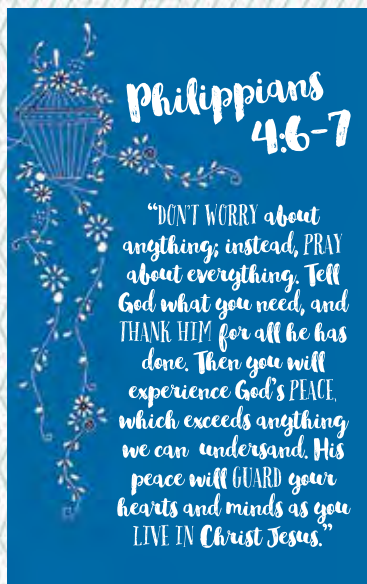
While the glutens are cooking in the broth, make the mushroom sauce.

Mushroom Sauce

250 gm mushrooms sliced, and sautéed in butter.
Make into a gravy by adding $\frac{3}{4}$ cup milk and $\frac{3}{4}$ cups water (approx).
Thicken with Bisto & cornflour.
Season with salt & pepper to taste.

To Put Together

Take glutens out of broth, but save the broth.
Slice gluten steaks into strips length-wise
Brown in a little oil (be very gentle) in fry-pan
Heat broth. Gently add fried glutens and mushroom sauce.
Sprinkle 1 packet of Maggi French Onion Soup on top and mix in.
Heat through and mix in 125 gm sour cream before serving.

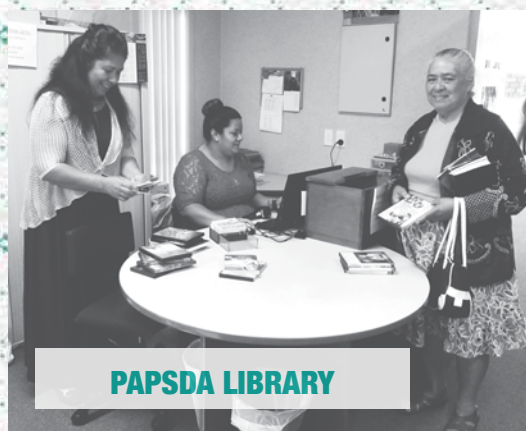
S.H.A.P.E is all about discovering your spiritual giftings and it has been happening during the month of May during our Sabbath discussion group time.

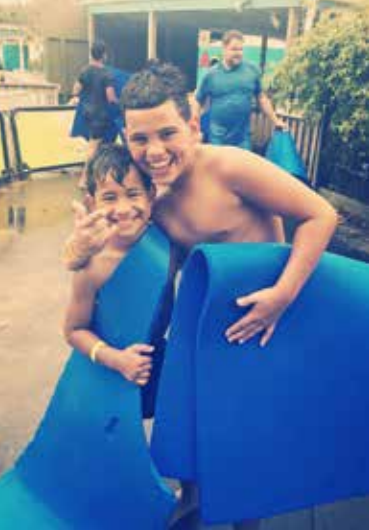

7 Things Our Kids Need From Their Parents To Limit Abandoning God

Everyone has experienced a young person throwing aside their faith, directly or indirectly.

So, does the church need to change? Or is there a different question?

You see, I believe **parents** are the primary link between young people and God. Not the church.

In his book *Soul Searching*, Christian Smith says this: *The most important social influence in shaping young people's Christianity is the Christian life modelled and taught to them by their parents.*

Here's the deal. Parents, you are painting a portrait of God for your children every day. Every word, action and conversation is a brush-stroke. When your children prepare to leave home, they are staring at a portrait of God that shapes their actions and decisions about faith moving forward.

Are there exceptions? Absolutely. I witnessed young people leave Jesus, even though the faith of their parents was rock solid. I also saw young people continue into college on fire for God, even though their parents had shaky, fickle faith. So, this isn't a black and white issue. Few issues are.

But will you, as a parent, play an enormous role in shaping the faith of your children? No doubt.

With that said, I want to point out some things young people need from their parents.

1) **THEY NEED YOU TO STOP HANDING THEIR FAITH OFF TO YOUTH LEADERS.**

In the first few months as a youth pastor, I noticed something alarming. It appeared as though parents looked to me as the primary person responsible for the spiritual growth of their kids. Why is this alarming? The Bible makes no mention of this model.

Unfortunately, most churches have created this perception.

But there is a problem when children and youth ministry becomes THE tool. I think it is a great tool for building faith in young people. However, **parents, you have the primary responsibility** of building faith in your children. Children and Youth leaders exist to equip you and supplement the work you are doing in the home. They don’t exist to replace you.

2) THEY NEED YOU TO CARE AS MUCH ABOUT THEIR STRUGGLES AS YOU DO ABOUT THEIR SALVATION.

Growing up, I remember numerous conversations with my parents about baptism. Almost too many. I grew to hate the word *baptism*, and with every conversation about why I needed to be baptised, I took one step further away from God.

As strange as this sounds, I needed someone to care as much about my struggles as they did about my salvation. I struggled mightily in high school. I searched everywhere for my identity. I travelled down dark roads searching for direction.

It was as if my salvation was the only thing that mattered. Eventually, I started to see God this way. He didn’t have much to say about my present struggles. He just wanted me to be *saved*. And I didn’t care much for a God who didn’t inform my current situation. So, I left.

You can’t manufacture salvation. But you can show people God’s love.

Parents, what you can do is show the love of God to your children. This starts by helping them see their present struggles as God’s concern. Sit down with your children. Talk to them. Show them grace.

As you do this, the gospel will come to life. Because the gospel doesn’t just inform salvation. It informs everything. Addictions. Temptations. Identity issues. And once your children see that God walks with them through their struggles, they will have a stronger desire to give their lives to him.

3) THEY NEED YOU TO ANSWER THE QUESTIONS THEY ARE ASKING.

Today’s culture is extremely complex. Young people

see everything. Information (good and bad) is available on-demand. And as young people battle with difficult questions about sexuality and social issues, among many other things, the world is forming their perspective. Every article. Every conversation. Every video.

It is more important than ever that parents open up space to discuss difficult topics. It’s time to stop turning a blind eye to the questions prevalent in the lives of your kids. Naivety is not an excuse. Awkwardness and tension won’t work as excuses either.

Yes, these conversations are awkward. Yes, they create tension. But your children are asking them. Unless you create space for the hard questions, they will turn to other sources for answers. And that usually doesn’t end well.

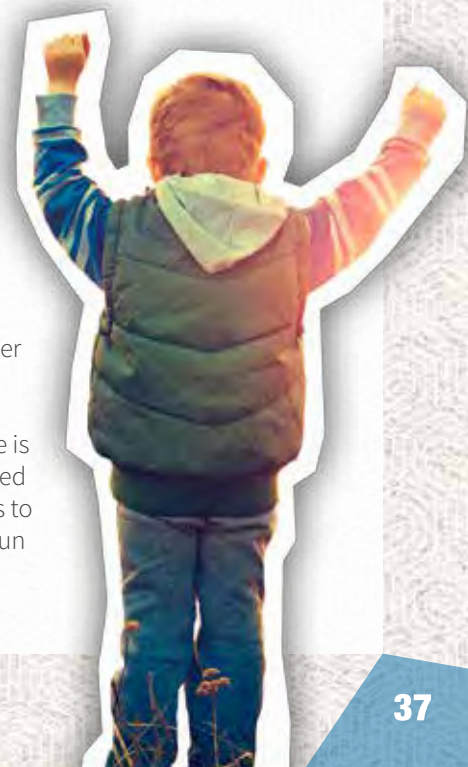
4) THEY NEED YOU TO STOP PROTECTING THEM.

The world is broken. No argument from me there. It seems as though our world is more sinful than ever.

But I wonder what the response would be if the same microscope were placed on cities like Ephesus and Corinth? During the time of Paul, Ephesus was overtaken by witchcraft. Every spring, roughly a million people travelled to the temple of Artemis, which was filled with prostitutes.

Let’s just say these people weren’t going to the temple to talk about the weather.

So, how does Paul instruct the Ephesians to respond in the midst of a culture blanketed with sin? He tells them to put on the armour of God (*Eph. 6:10-20*). In other words, jump in the fight. Paul didn’t understand a theology of retreat. There is no such thing. He expected the Christians in Ephesus to engage the culture, not run from it.

5) THEY NEED TO SEE GOD AS MORE THAN RULES AND CHURCH ATTENDANCE.

Every decision, every thought and every action comes down to this: In whom do I place my trust? ~Kara Powell

Looking back on my childhood, this was the most important factor in my faith as I transitioned into college. I needed to see that my parents trusted the promises of God. I needed to see that my parents made decisions as though God was real and alive, not a set of rules or a list of *do's and don'ts*.

Parents, never underestimate the impact of your decisions on your children. They need to see you trust God with your time and money. They need to see you approach your job as a mission field. They need to see you love people well. All people. They need to see you trust the promises of God in Scripture.

If you boil Christian living down to church attendance and morality, your children will notice. And who wants to follow a God who is nothing more than rules and showing up to a building? I sure don't.

6) THEY NEED TO SEE YOUR STRUGGLES AND DOUBTS.

Let's get real for a second. God is mysterious. Faith is not easy. Some questions about God don't have easy answers. You have probably experienced days where you considered throwing in the towel.

Join the club. I want you to meet some people. These are the apostles. Yeah, the ones who walked with Jesus and started the church. Yes, they are at the / *have doubted my faith at some point club*.

Parents, your kids have doubts. And they need to see that you have doubts as well. Otherwise, when questions about God come, your kids will either internalise them or turn to another source for answers. Both are bad options.

I am not telling you to have confession hour every night. But there is power in vulnerability and authenticity. Your kids need to know you are human. And they need to know the path to intimacy with God involves seasons of doubt and struggle.

7) THEY NEED YOU TO PLEAD FOR GOD TO BUILD AND SUSTAIN THEIR FAITH.

Parents, in the journey to lay a foundation of faith for your children, nothing is more important than prayer. Pray for your children. Pray with your children. Every day.

Never stop praying for your kids. Don't allow their current circumstances to impact God's power. Even if your child is light years from God, God is only a prayer away from them.

Parents, you are painting a portrait of God for your children. What does the picture look like?

It is never too late to start investing in the faith of your children. It is also never too early to get started. Set the trajectory of faith for your children now.

The church plays a role in the faith of your children. But the primary responsibility is yours, parents. You've got this. God would never give you a task and not equip you for it. Your children don't need the funniest, most knowledgeable or best communicator to build their faith. They need you.

So, give them what they need. ■

Sowing into the work at Papsda just got simpler and quicker!

You will have seen Papsda promoting Pushpay recently as a way of making donations to Papsda from your mobile phone by downloading the Pushpay App.

You may ask: Why is Papsda promoting Pushpay?

The world is moving to Mobile. We are able to do more and more on our phones. Pushpay was invented by New Zealanders especially for churches and is the fastest way to donate to your church. Many churches in New Zealand provide Pushpay for their members and Pushpay has been launched in Australia and the USA. So far 3,500 churches in USA have signed up to Pushpay since it has been available there.

You need to have a credit card to be able to use Pushpay. It is very easy to set up. There is a video link on the Papsda E-Update that you can play to learn more. Otherwise ask one of our staff.

It does not matter where you are in New Zealand, or the world. As long as you have coverage (WiFi), you can donate to Papsda.

Say you are sitting in church and you forgot to bring an offering. Just click on your Pushpay App and enter the amount you wish to give and then select "Today's Offering" and hit "Donate" and it's done. You will receive an e-mail confirming your donation. File the e-mails in a

folder and you have a full record of your giving.

Maybe you had lunch at church and forgot your \$5 donation. Just select *Papsda Ministries* and on the next line where it says "Reference" just enter "Church Lunch".

If you wish to give to one of our International Projects select "International Projects" and in the Reference field put either "Cambodia" or "South Africa."

You will see the list also includes Tithe, Papsda Staff Fund, Papsda Ministries Fund, Capital Projects and Service Projects Local. In the Reference column for the last three funds you can be specific about where you want your money to go.

We will continue to accept Tithes and Donations through the tithe envelopes in cheque or cash form, or using the EFTPOS machine at Guest Central or by you paying directly into the Papsda bank account. The choice is yours. You can of course use more than one method to give.

RAW MEXICAN BURRITO

INGREDIENTS:

2 large avocados
1 red onion (diced)
1 small purple and/or green cabbage head
2 tomatoes (diced)
2 red or yellow capsicum (diced)
1 lemon
2 cloves of garlic (minced)
½ bunch of coriander (chopped)
½ teaspoon of Himalayan salt
Pinch of paprika

TO MAKE GUACAMOLE:

Mash or blend the avocados, either by hand or in a food processor
Add onion, coriander, garlic, salt, and paprika. Squeeze lemon over the mixture.
Stir all ingredients through together, mixing well.

TO MAKE WRAPS:

Slice cabbage in half and carefully separate each leaf.
Choose 4 large leaves and remove the stem on the outside of the leaf (this makes it easier to wrap and roll the burrito).
Spread guacamole mixture on the inside of each leaf.
Add the tomatoes and the capsicum, making sure to keep the vegetables in the centre of the leaf to ensure an easier wrap.
Roll into a burrito shape by folding the bottom of the leaf towards the centre, and then folding the outer sides into the middle.

CHOCOLATE ENERGY BALLS

INGREDIENTS:

12 dates (seeds removed)
1/4 cup of cocoa powder
1/3 cup shredded coconut
1 cup almonds
1 tablespoon chia seeds
1 tablespoon rice malt syrup

METHOD:

Place all ingredients into a blender, and blend until well combined.
Take a tablespoon of mixture and roll with hands into small balls, with the diameter approximately the size of a 20 cent piece.
Roll the balls into the shredded coconut, and refrigerate for 30 minutes until set.

Makes 16 balls.

When I became a Christian, to be honest I didn't know the *mind-blowing* meaning of the word—even though I knew many Christians in their various forms.

Over the years and to this day the gift of transportation has increased its fold with Tracey and Ricky Ryan, Karyn and Richard Newson, Keira Bullock, Gavin Liggett, Moana Puna, Elaine Colquhoun, Vaikini and Maile Teulilo, Raela Moore, Helene Boltman, Brian and Colleen McKeown, Karl and Karin Saifoloi, Alice and Lloyd Saifoloi, Norman and Liz Hurlow, Rupe Charlie and Mutarau Turoa, Linda Curtis, Ruta and Tevita Langi, Robin and Peter Greenfield, Denver Lawson, Adrian Van der Merwe, Eddie Tupa'i, Lynette Clark, Stephanie Clarry, Lana and Peter Harvey and anyone else that has ever offered transport (my apologies if I have missed your name) is without a doubt *mind-blowing*!

Early in 2013 applications were being processed for the second Papsda Church camp at Cambridge, when at work one day I received an email from Karyn Newson informing me I need not pay for the camp fees as someone (not wanting to be named) had already paid (there were 5 of us going)! Honestly, I was GOB-SMACKED. I couldn't contain my tears and had to leave my desk for a while. I'd always been able to pay for things and if I couldn't afford it, then it simply didn't happen. I felt as though this just wasn't happening to me. Incredibly *mind-blowingly* CRAZY!

A couple of months later and unbeknown to me I was about to become the recipient of honour at the annual Mother's Day Pamper Event. My Lord I cried. That just doesn't happen to a creature of secularism, heathenism, you name it... felt unworthy to be honoured in God's church. Aah, aah, but I was honoured nonetheless. There I was for all the congregation to see, flowers in hand, drenched in embarrassment, dissolving in tears, I graciously

First Impressions ministry is more than wishing people “Happy Sabbath,” handing out pamphlets and shaking peoples hand on a Saturday morning. I understand it’s not everyone’s cup of cocoa, particularly when you know certain people just want to bypass it to get to their place in the pew before someone else claims it—however, it is here that I have formed some very profound relationships, by sharing stories of past and present hurts. It is often with tears, that we minister to each other and rediscover our purpose in serving in this ministry. I appreciate Karyn Newson who continually loves on everyone in her leadership of this ministry, the batches of cookies made with love by Carolyn Ellis, the weekly messages of God’s love from Lois Lowrie... Positivity beams, from this *mind-blowing* ministry.

To complete this never-ending story I would like to take the opportunity to acknowledge two very significant people in my life. Tracey and Ricky Ryan, for their continued support for myself and my family. Not only do they provide transport, opportunity and Godly hospitality they surround us with unconditional love, care and support, a safe place when life gets tough, nothing is ever too much: Lunches, coffee and cake, laughter and tears, and a life group to stay connected with *mind-blowing* care. I am forever grateful.

A *mind-blowing* thank you to everyone at Papsda who I have connected with and yet to connect with; your messages, time, smiles and reassurances of love count and are a part of God’s plan for everyone’s salvation.

THE VIRGINIA REPORT



Ever had the sense of déjà vu? It's what I experienced as I packed up my bags on a Sunday back in February to leave Honiara and make my way back to Suva to assist ADRA Fiji in its response to Tropical Cyclone Winston. Less than 12 months before I was doing something similar to help with Tropical Cyclone Pam in Vanuatu. That happened on a weekend too. It seems Tropical Cyclones have no respect of normal working hours!

The Adventist Development and Relief Agency (ADRA) Fiji works year-round helping some of the country's poorest families to thrive, through access to sustainable sources of water, food and income. These long-term projects provide opportunities to make powerful relationships with local communities and government agencies. These relationships are crucial in the time of a disaster such as Cyclone Winston.

In addition to the in-country staff and relationships ADRA Fiji can call upon its international network to provide funds and additional staffing to help cope with the

workload—that's how I found myself flying into Suva.

This additional staffing, the Emergency Response Team (ERT), is trained on how to assist in such a response. In a disaster there are literally countless things to do—a myriad of coordination meetings need to be attended, many proposals and budgets need preparing and vital communications need to be disseminated. And, all of that on top the headline-grabbing work of distributing emergency supplies. All of this takes valuable time and is where the ERT most supports the local country office. Items for distribution are procured based on needs assessed by government and NGO's including ADRA.

So what was my role in Fiji? Coordination. It's far more exciting than it sounds. The reality is ADRA does not act alone in responding to disasters and coordination exists to ensure that no one misses out or receives duplicate help from the multiple agencies operating within a country in disaster times.

As I reflect on what happened when I finally arrived in Suva, the long, long days, lots of talking and e-mails and coordinating, I am grateful to God for the blessing to be a part of ADRA's ERT. ADRA is well-respected in Fiji and across the globe—and did an incredible job helping the people of Fiji in the wake of Cyclone Winston.

The Middle

Hearing a story is powerful but being where that story happened—seeing, hearing, feeling, smelling, tasting—takes the experience to a whole new level. Forty-three Papsda-ites and friends recently experienced the Bible in a whole new way as they traveled through Israel, Jordan, Egypt and Greece. Each day they walked where Bible characters had walked and read and discussed the Bible stories that had happened at these places.

Stephen and Leanne lead the group accompanied, by world-renowned archaeologist Dr Larry Geraty from La Sierra Adventist University in California. Stephen and Leanne had visited the Bible Lands on several occasions previously and were excited to share the experience with other Papsda people. Here are some reflections from the group.

What the Seas Taught me in One Day

So you may ask: how has the Bible Lands trip changed me? I had some epic adventures, learnt a lot, walked where Jesus *traditionally* walked, made lasting

connections with new and old friends, but essentially came back the same person. Same same, but different.

I will endeavour to share briefly with you how a couple of experiences on

the trip impacted my thinking and made me question some areas of my life.

Two of my favourite days on the trip were when we sailed on the Sea of Galilee **and** floated in the Dead Sea. We sailed across the Sea of Galilee in a boat very similar to what Jesus would've sailed in. We sang, danced and worshipped together and even witnessed an *authentic* fishing demonstration.

The Sea of Galilee was teeming with life (minus the fish in the fishing demonstration). The water was clear and fresh and the banks green. What struck me later in the day was the contrast between the two seas that are so closely situated in a geographical context but yet so different. The Dead Sea, with its 33% salt content, can't sustain any life at all. The water was foggy and filmy and a build up of salt around the shoreline made it look like a child had drawn an outline around the sea with a white marker.

So why is one sea thriving and the other dying? The

reason is not so much its source, but its outlet; where its flowing to. Water flows **in** and **out** of the Sea of Galilee (via the Jordan River) but only flows **in** to the Dead Sea; and the result is staggering.

It got me thinking...

- Do I need to start living a life where giving is more important than receiving?
- What am I holding on to that I need to let go of in order to thrive?
- Am I selfishly trying to contain God?
- If I am not actively letting God's love flow out of me will I become stagnant?

I read a quote once that said, *"There will always be the unknown. There will always be the unprovable. But faith confronts those frontiers with a thrilling leap. Then life becomes vibrant with new adventure."*

But who knew that the *Dead* Sea would make this come *alive* for me?

I'd heard all the stories about people floating in the Dead Sea but it all sounded so unbelievable. Until the moment I shed my bathrobe, applied the healing mud and precariously ventured into the salty unknown for myself. I had doubts that it would work for me; I thought I'd be the first person to sink straight to the bottom and I was prepared for failure.

But then I was in—and experiencing it for myself—and it was glorious! What an alien yet wonderful sensation to lose all control as an inexplicable anti-gravitational force takes hold of your limbs and forces them skywards.

I watched as one by one, others displayed a similar hesitancy getting in. And each time disbelief transformed into understanding, tentativeness into pure *in-the-moment* joy.

And again—it got me thinking...

- Am I missing out on the ultimate adventure of a relationship with God because I'm letting my doubts hold me back?
- Do I need to understand God completely before I surrender to him completely?

- What faith leaps do I need to take to experience life fully?
- And why not unashamedly raise my hands skywards and thank God in moments of joy?

Petra: Rose Gold City

Ever since I was 16 and saw slides of that mysterious and magnificent city hewn from rose red rock, I wanted to visit Petra in Jordan. More than 50 years later I actually stood at the narrow entrance of the Siq—a fissure in the massively tall rocks, and danced in excited delight!

How marvellous to actually be there, right there, and walk through the long, narrow, rocky passage and then to see for myself the magnificent three-storied *Treasury House* carved out of the rose red rock. I had no idea how massive this city had been. Inside the mountainous enclosure were numerous houses built into the rock and apparently there are over 2,000 temples spread about the town. The city thrived for hundreds of years because it had a secure water supply from underground springs, was amazing well-defended by the narrow entrance created by a crevice in the rock, and it prospered because it provided a resting place to the numerous caravans of merchants as they trudged across the desert carrying spices and silks from the East.

This incredible city built so long ago was initially inhabited by the Edomites, descendants of Esau, Jacob's brother.

While it was thriving, God through the prophets Jeremiah (chapter 49) and Obadiah warned, *“those who lived in the clefts of the rocks and made their homes on the heights, will be brought to the ground... They will be ransacked and their hidden treasures pillaged ... and you will be destroyed forever”*.

God was particularly unhappy with the Edomites because they refused

to help their refugee relatives when they were led by Moses across the desert on their journey from Egypt and later they regularly attacked the Jewish people. Furthermore, on a weekly basis the Edomites sacrificed a young virgin to the sun god and we actually saw this place on the top of the mountain where the unfortunate young women were killed.

As we wandered around this now desolate place, the words from the prophets rung in my ears.

For a long time scholars doubted Petra ever existed and scoffed about the prophecy. However in 1812, the Swiss explorer John Burkhardt, disguised as a Sheikh, persuaded some Bedouins to show him the secret city hidden in the rocks, and Petra (Sela in Scripture) was rediscovered for all to realise afresh. *"God is not mocked"*. He speaks the truth and His Word will stand forever. ■

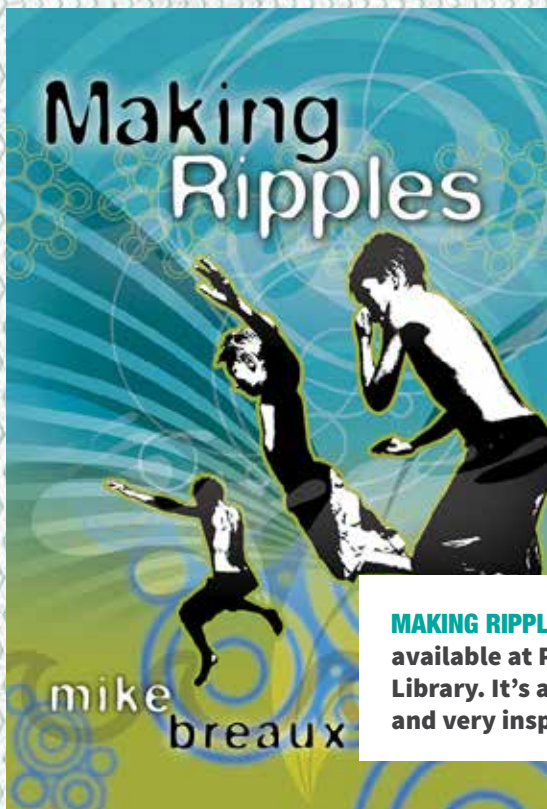

Jacinda Turnbull-Harman had the pleasure of catching up with Chris Engel, who played a part in the start-up of men's ministry, Men of the Vine, a group of *Staunch Followers* of Christ who are *Mind-Blowingly Generous* with their time, gifts and talents, using them for *Selfless Service* to others. Here is their story.

For those of us who haven't heard the story of how Men of the Vine got started, tell us how it all began.

It all started with a few men who were asked if they had ever been to a *Promise Keepers Men's Conference*. Strangers at church really, with the all-familiar "eye-flick" greeting. God had a plan. Drawn to each other for serious deliberation in the pews at Papsda, a few of us found ourselves singing in the Promise Keepers Men's Conference choir just weeks later. We were so blessed and inspired with the experience at that event, that it left us with a strong conviction to do something with what God had gifted us with over the two-day conference. Buzzing with the flame of Christ in our hearts, we could not settle for less knowing that over 150 men and 100 teenage boys had committed their lives to Christ that weekend. The theme for the conference in October 2015 was GO! Go wherever God leads.

We firmly believe this is where we had to Go!

So the four of us, Brendon Wrampling, Joseph Ngapo, Adriaan van der Merwe and me, Chris Engel, started up a ministry called *Men of the Vine*.

What's your mission as Men of the Vine?

To serve the lost and broken in the community and paint a true picture of Jesus Christ. As Christ imparts his master plan for our mission across New Zealand we are always in prayer for more men to join us and expand the message of Salvation to all. With more hands on deck this ministry can be increased so many do not miss out on the joy of Life in Christ. This is our motto... We want to:

V = Value I = Inspire N = Nurture E = Equip

What are some of the things Men of the Vine have been doing in and around the community, and how have the recipients of your ministry have been affected or how have they have reacted?

We tap into Papsda ministries as well as other community outreach groups and complete the chain where there's a need—whatever the requirement is. We have delivered food parcels, done garden maintenance, property clean-ups as well as just connecting and listening where it's needed in people's homes.

It is a very humbling and such a spiritual experience when you are standing at the door of a destitute family handing over a much-needed food parcel that they were not expecting. Many cannot believe this still happens in everyday life. There are tears and yes, we try to hold our own back many times. We experience such delight too as people see that we not super-heroes, but ordinary men with a story to share.

A funny story of staying positive: Take on a 1.2 metre high lawn, totally overgrown, with neighbours gawking over the fence from both sides as you sweat it out. They assume we're from Housing New Zealand with the thorough job we did. Then there's the old pass-me-by: Who's going to clean the toilet to match the newly painted walls? Yes, we get dirty and know that it's our schooling for growing the Kingdom.

What drives this passion for service?

There is a tremendous amount of people in our community that don't understand church-talk, or the value of having community with church family and the wonder of Christ.

We have a practical way of expressing God's love to individuals and families, and in doing this we TRUST that they will come to know God for who He is: a loving God who only wants good for them and their families, not some big guy with all these rules to follow.

We have experienced joy physically working in the Kingdom as we humbly testify to the melting of stone hearts with the love expressed as we accomplish work in homes and community outreach.

It is the overwhelming feeling of Jesus holding his arms around us as we were once lost, unloved and stone-hearted too.

When do you all meet? How does someone get involved?

We get together every Wednesday evening at 7:30pm in the youth room upstairs from the Dining Room at Papsda. Everyone is welcome as we share God's word through the Bible; videos to encourage and grow us; testimonies of our daily challenges and the Victory that Christ delivers us into. A fun small and diverse group that is hungry for the Word and God's guidance.

Where to from here?

In a short time we have seen the power of Christ working in our lives and in this men's ministry. Our joy in what we experiencing and doing liken us to kids in a candy store.

Our dream is firstly outreach at the doorsteps of our church and then with God's continued guidance complete a Men's Spiritual Development Programme to be initiated throughout our churches and communities in New Zealand.

In conclusion, we have seen the wonders of Christ and we are active in sharing and testifying with the gospel at midweek community outreach programmes.

Praise God for his ever-present guidance as we partake in the work of His Kingdom, remaining humbled by His grace. ■

by Miss Samoa New Zealand. Christina has a real heart for the community and seeing people reach their fitness goals while having A LOT of fun!

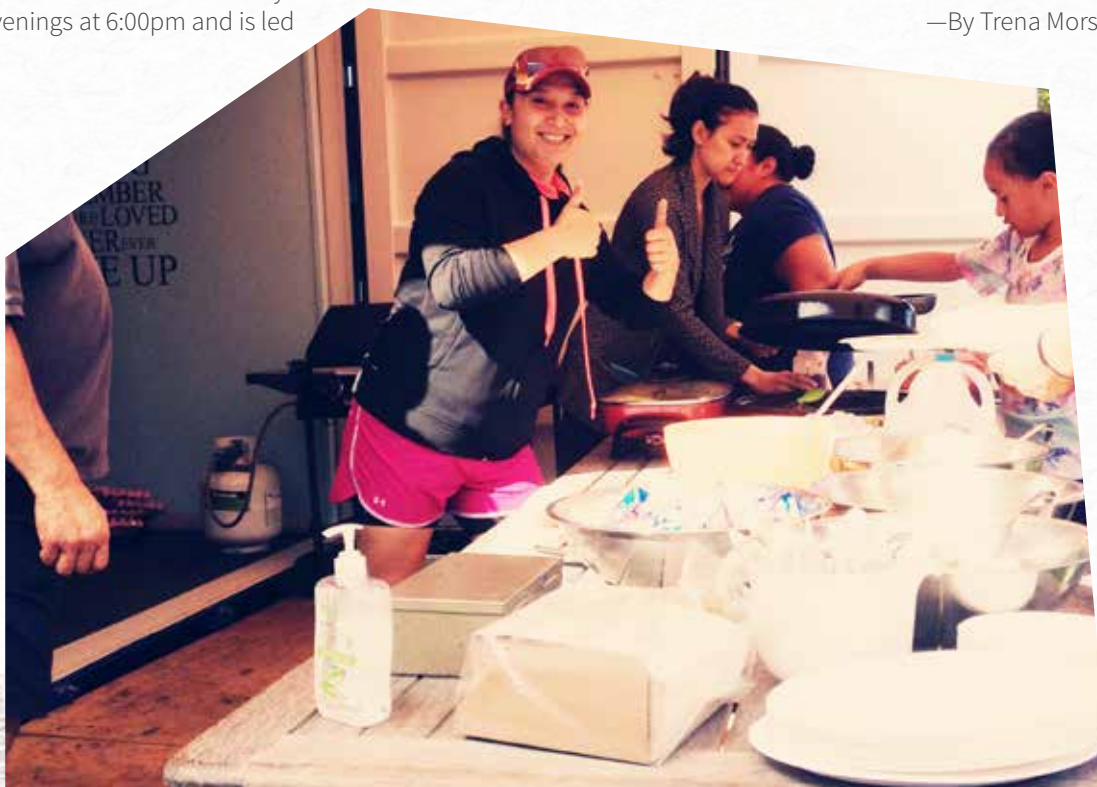
LEADERSHIP

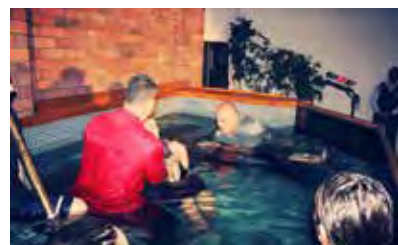

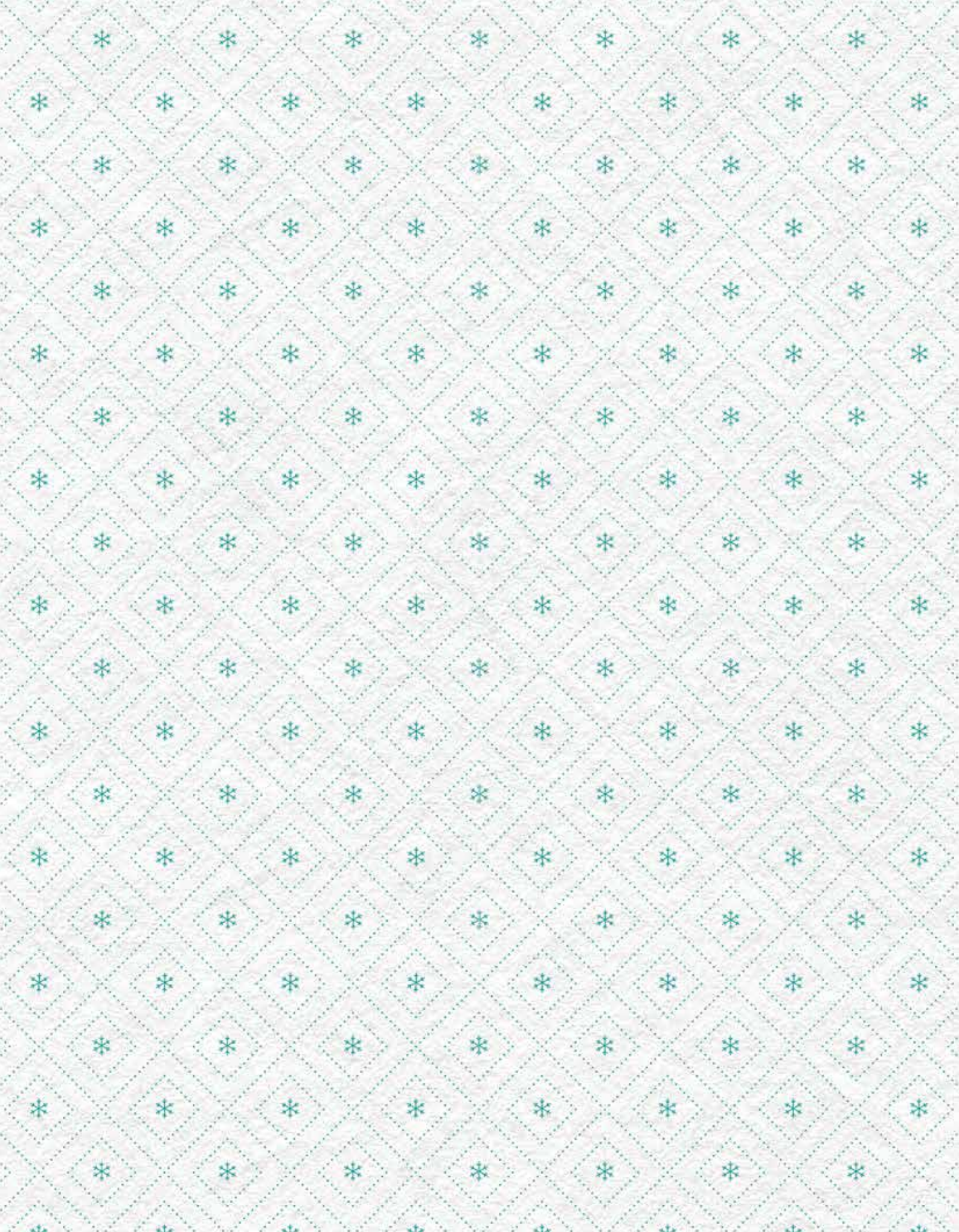
